Dear Friends,

Revival! It's an old-fashioned word, but one that is still very necessary among faithful people. It happens in churches and congregations throughout the world, across all denominations, in large towns and major cities, small communities and even remote villages.

Revival comes to a church, very much like our own, when we get set in our ways, when everything becomes routine and so-so, when the same old things go on week after week, month after month, year after year. Instead of yearning for God, we end up yawning. Instead of being fired up with the Spirit, we cozy down and slumber.

Erin needs revival. Faith has become so easy to us that we're taking God for granted. We've heard the scriptures so many times, that we're bored with them. Instead of being alive to Christ and spreading His message, we've become dead to the Spirit and dyed in the wool. And if you think this doesn't apply to us, then ask yourself the following questions:

- Is Sunday worship important to me, or I can take it or leave it?
- Do I open my Bible everyday or just when I need it?
- Are my prayers very short and straight to the point, or do I take time to talk to God?
- If I gave up my faith today, would it make any difference to how I live my life?
- If Jesus returned as I'm reading this sentence, would I be ready to meet Him?

If your faith has grown flabby and weary, insignificant and insubstantial, then you need



revival. If your life is disappointing and you haven't any purpose, then you need revival. If Jesus is just a story book character in your head or a pleasant childhood memory, then you need revival. If you find yourself empty, isolated and alone, abandoned in a wilderness and weary of the world, then you, my friend, need revival.

Our Creative ministry team, Erin Express are taking this need for revival very seriously. At the moment, those involved with the group are preparing & writing a special music and drama presentation which will become a launch pad for revival in our own church and across several Presbyterian congregations in this area.

The need for revival in a whole host of like-minded Presbyterian churches across our city and in the surrounding communities, has given our Creative ministry team a valuable vision, a godly goal and a divine dream to be recognized, visualized and realized throughout this summer.

You can be part of this ministry too. We not only need singers and musicians, but dramatists, dancers, sound and lightning technicians, shakers and movers, costumiers, sponsors, donors and publicists. And if you can't do any of those things, then there is one other important talent that we need - prayer people. Pray for revival in our wee church. Pray for revival to fall like sweet rains upon the hearts and minds, souls and spirits of all our people. Pray for revival which will re-equip, enable and enhance our whole church, so that we can go out into the world around us breathing life into weary people and faith into lost hearts.

May Jesus restore His joy to your heart and may you seek to worship His ways.

ERIN GARAGE SALE

What do these words, numbers and letters refer to? A secret code? Actually, you'll find these words, numbers and letters and many others in our hymnal under the title of the hymn. Hymns are made up of two basic elements - tunes and poems. The tunes often had their own names separate from the poems. Tune names might be taken from the composer's, arranger's, or lyricists name. They could also be based on where the tune was composed or where the first performance was held. Or, they might be pulled out of thin air! The early hymnals listed the hymns by tune names only, i.e. Dennis, Dundee, Hyfrydol, etc., referencing the poem only by its first line in an index. In the middle of the 20th century, a change was made to list a hymn name as well as the tune name. A notable exception were the praise and gospel songbooks and hymnbooks that appeared in the early 1900's. They listed the songs only by hymn name.

PER CAPITA

The poems that have been set to these hymn tunes, such as Hyfrydol, can be interchanged with other hymn tunes. For instance, if you look in the hymnal, Hyfrydol is followed by the numbers 8787D. These numbers simply tell you how many syllables are in each line of the hymn. The D tells you the rhythm is in duple or 2. In many cases, the tune used initially by a poem has changed to some other tune over the years. Often, different poems use the same tune.



Per Capita is paid by each church who is a member of the Presbytery and is based on a church's annual membership, which is taken from the submitted church statistic form. Yearly membership dues are \$28.56 per church member and are given to three areas; and they are:

- 1. General Assembly \$5.44
- 2. Presbytery of East Tennessee \$20.00
- 3. Senate \$3.12

Grand Total Per Church Member \$28.56

Therefore, for the 2003 year, the church will pay \$8339.52. That is \$694.96 per month. It is requested that each church member pay for their own membership fees for 2003. Payments can be made monthly (\$2.38) or yearly (\$28.56). Please remember to write "Per Capita" in the memo line of your check. This money is tax deductible and will be included on your contribution report. For more information, please contact Millisa, 588-5350, in the church office.

THE ERIN CHOIR NEEDS YOU!

Next Sunday (not during the sermon!) take a look at the Metrical Index of Tunes found in the back of your hymnal. Check under the numbers 8787D and you will find more than two dozen hymn tunes listed. All of these hymns can be interchanged with each other because their meter is exactly the same. In other words, the number of syllables in each line of each of these tunes is the same. Try it out. Sing the tune of "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" (Hyfrydol) to "Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken" or "What a Friend of Jesus". Think of the possibilities!

The Erin Choir seeks singers to bolster our ranks. No experience is necessary. No audition is required. You won't be forced to sing a solo! If you can read music, that's great. WITNESING FOR JESUS CHRIST

These are the thoughts and ideas of how a Christian layperson can witness for our Lord, Creator, Savior, Redeemer, Mediator, Holy Spirit, and Friend – Jesus Christ.

As stated in Matthew 28:18-20, it began in the springtime about 2000 years ago in a middle-eastern country called Palestine. A quiet group of men were gathered on a mountain in the northern province of Galilee. The men have come here as they have been told. Some women and children are silently standing on the fringes of the assembly.

The men are giving their full attention to a man standing within their midst. Their behavior indicates that this man is very familiar to them, and they want to hear every word of the man. The speaker is using the common language of Palestine-Aramaic. His speech is slow and deliberate. His voice is kind, but with much authority. The men are given instruction and encouragement. They nod in agreement. A movement by the speaker indicates that he is finished and about to depart. But before he does so, he raises his arms in a blessing and addressing the group, he gives his final instruction.

“All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always to the very end of the age.” NIV

And according to the New Testament, the disciples of Jesus Christ went forth and told others and wrote about their Savior and His promise to all who believed in Him. Since their witnessing and for over 2000 years, the Word has been carried around the World. Today, all Christians are commanded to tell others about Jesus Christ.

Have you ever heard a sermon on witnessing for Jesus Christ or read an article in a periodic explaining about how it is important for each Christian to witness for Jesus Christ or heard your Sunday School discussing witnessing? Have you every wondered how you would witness or more important what you would say to a person about our Savior Jesus Christ? Or did the thought run through your mind on how you would approach a person? What should you say? Should you have some key scriptures memorized to back your witnessing? When is the best time to witness?

These questions have entered my mind, and I would safely bet they have entered the minds of most Christians. But, we should not permit these questions or fear or timidity to deter us from our Christ-directed mission of witnessing for our Savior and Christ.

The word “witness” signifies strength. When you look at the word, you will discover that it is a strong action word. Usually, when we use the word *witness*, we picture a courtroom scene of a person giving testimony. The dictionary defines witness as one who is called to testify before a court. In reference to witnessing for Jesus Christ, I like the definition, “one who has seen or heard something.”

In the New Testament, the prime example of someone seeing and hearing something would be the Apostle Paul on the road to Damascus. Paul’s conversations takes place in Acts 9 and in Acts 13. In the chapters one can read about Paul’s life as a witness for Jesus during his four missionary journeys.

After the Damascus road incident and Paul went into the city, he was visited by Ananias (Acts 9:15-16), who acting as God’s spokesperson commanded Paul to tell others about Jesus Christ – who Jesus was and His mission on earth.

Tell others about Jesus! Paul certainly did, and his writings are spiritual blessings because readers can gain spiritual wisdom and insight that explains the truth of God’s plan of love for His human creations and how though Him they can find love, justice and salvation.

Tell others about Jesus! How much should a person know about Jesus Christ before they would feel comfortable witnessing for Jesus Christ? 1.) Your personal testimony; 2.) Each of the four Gospels has this purpose in mind when written. (Dr. Rev. Billy Graham usually recommends reading the Gospel of John when he is questioned about knowing more about Jesus Christ.); 3.) There are two books that I personally recommend: a) *Halley’s Bible Handbook* by Henry H. Halley, and b) *What the Bible is All About* by Henrietta C. Mears.

The following prayer is from the March-April issue of *The Upper Room*: “Lord Jesus Christ, help each of us shine not for our glory, but in order to point others to you. Amen.”
