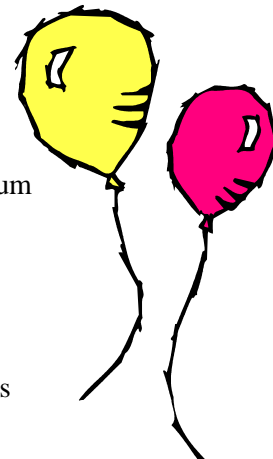
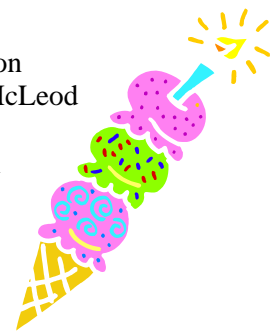

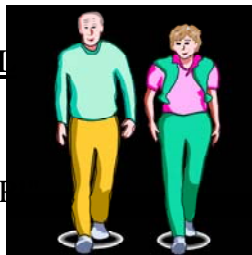
TO THE PASTOR AND PEOPLE OF ERIN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH:

THE SENIOR SACK LUNCH

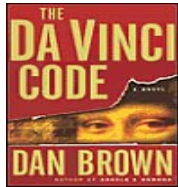

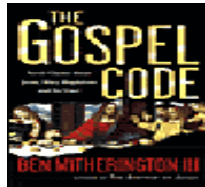

LOAVES & FISHES

VOTE!

Place: Any Town/City USA

Characters: Johnny Pilgrim, M/M Jefferson Pilgrim, and Mr. H

Time: One month prior to now

Johnny Pilgrim, a walk-the-talk Christian was 18-years-old on the previous July 4. Johnny is concerned about the coming November election, and he is talking with his parents about some of the election's issues. After discussing some of the issues, the conversation got around to discussing the recent primary election where out of 200,000 registered voters only 19 to 20 percent of the voters went to the polls.

There was a lively discussion on why so few of the registered voters went to the polls and how in a primary with so few voting, will electors in the general election be faced with the best qualified candidates. Johnny asked, "Does a voter's vote really count in an election?".

Jefferson and Dolly Pilgrim could not answer completely so they suggested he go next door to Mr. H, an American government teacher at a local

high school, and ask him the question, "Does a voter's vote really count in an election?".

Mr. H invited Johnny into his home, and in reply asked, "What can I help you with?" Johnny said, "I have some questions about the power of one's vote in an election." Mr. H's eyes lit up and replied, "I think that I can help you, Johnny."

"Johnny, as you remember from studying American History in your junior year at high school, the history of voting was a long bitter fight. Certain people or group's civil rights were violated which kept them from voting. Finally, in the 20th Century, to maintain equality the Federal government passed voting laws and amended the United States Constitution. However, local governments had the right to require a person to do certain things in order to vote such as to register at the local government election office.

Let's consider two things: first – why should you vote, and second – does a vote really count? As a United States citizen, you are obligated to vote. Obligate is defined as a sense of duty. The freedoms we enjoy in this country were won by people who sacrificed much, including their lives. People died fighting for an issue named freedom.

The passage of Federal laws grows out of our country's issues. Our country needs to elect well-qualified candidates who will write good laws to solve the country's problems. So voting in the primary where most of our candidates originate is most important.

Another reason to vote is the freedom of choice. Now, this freedom is not written in the U.S. Constitution, but it is there. Probably some day a case will come before the United States Supreme Court who will rule that the freedom is there or implied. It is similar to the Free Will given to us by our Heavenly Father where you have the choice to do something such as follow Jesus Christ. So you have the choice: GO TO THE POLLS OR NOT GO! Did you ever think what might happen if you didn't have that choice?

Now to your question: "Does a person's vote really count?" Voting does not just occur in political elections. Issues come up in all forms of organizations

and an issue may pass or fail based on the majority vote (1 vote more than 50%). One prime example is in our Senate where the presiding officer casts a vote to break a tie. Remember, the Senate votes on bills that come to them from the House of Representatives. Also, Andres Johnson, our 17th President, was impeached, but acquitted by one vote. There are many examples of the important of one (1) vote.

And when you vote that is your representation in government. If you don't vote, a wrong person may be elected, nothing much is done in the legislative body, and the country gets weaker due to the problems. I always remember what the late Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes said, "Vigilance is the price of liberty." So Johnny, don't be like a good share or our electors who don't vote because they LACK INTEREST IN MATTERS OF POLITICS AND ELECTIONS. Johnny, here is a list that you can do to insure that Liberty will not come begging."

- 1) Register with your local election office. Here in Knoxville that it in the old Knox County courthouse, corner of Main and Gay.
- 2) Obtain a post card registration form – fill it out and mail it. It has to be received by the election office by October 2. The Knoxville address for mailing your registration form is:

- 3) Study issues facing your local, state, or federal governments.
- 4) Know candidates and their stand on issues. Know how incumbents voted on bills pertaining to issues.
- 5) Give some deep thought to campaigns rhetoric (Promises! Promises!)
- 6) Check your local newspapers for sample ballots to peruse prior to voting. Other items appear on ballots, besides candidates, such as changes in charters or vote on certain taxes. Also, polling places are published.
- 7) Make plans to vote.
- 8) Take your registration card and go vote even if it is raining!

Johnny: "Thank you, Mr. H. I really appreciate you taking the time, for the information and

advice. I will register to vote this afternoon, and I WILL VOTE ON Election Day, November 2.
