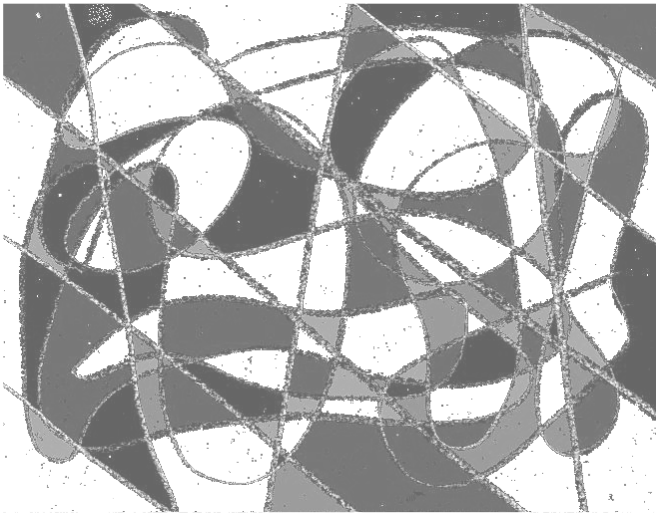

Dear Friends,

Do you know what an ICE number is? I didn't until I read about it in a Scottish newspaper recently. It was started a couple of years ago by a group of paramedics in Britain. Whenever people were involved in a serious accident on the winter roads, the paramedics would usually come across a cell phone next to the injured person. They would try to access the phone's numbers to find someone who knew about the emergency victim and get crucial information to help treat the injured party. But all they came across was a list of names and the paramedics didn't know which number to call.

That's when someone came up with the bright idea of establishing an ICE number on the cell phone list. ICE stands for In Case of Emergency. The cell phone owner lists his or her spouse, children, or a best friend under the name ICE,



which means that the paramedics can now directly contact kinfolk. It has saved lives in Britain because medical details can be checked over the phone at the accident site. And it has become so popular that people are now listing alternative contacts as ICE01 and ICE02, just in case the primary contact person is unavailable.

Christmas is a bit like that because it's the special time of year when God sent His Son into the world to become our primary contact. Up until that time, the only way to reach God was to ask a priest or Pharisee to intercede. When Christ was born among us, God gave us direct access to His Kingdom and Christ to be with us, so that on the most important day of our lives, we would not be lost forever but reclaimed and restored to God's eternal presence.

As we get ready to enter into the hustle and bustle of the busiest season in the year, let's remind ourselves that we have blessings other people never experienced – the blessing of knowing Jesus, the blessing of being saved, and the blessing of everlasting life through Him.

May Christ be with you and all your loved ones this Christmas.

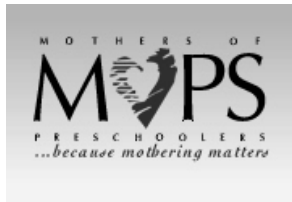

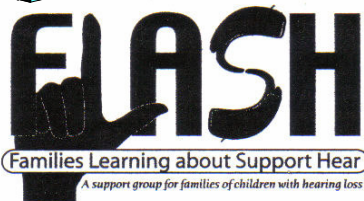
YOUTH MINISTRY

OUTREACH MINISTRY



The Middle schoolers raised \$50.72 for our first Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF.

That may not sound like very much to most of us, but this will provide children in need, who are every bit as precious as our own with: 724 boxes of crayons, immunizations for 50 children against measles and rubella for life, 16 children with pencil and paper to use in the classroom, and 12 children, who are probably sleeping out in the cold tonight with a large wool blanket. So this seemingly small amount can do a very great deal. Next year we hope to raise enough to provide 300 warm blankets! Good job trick-or-treaters!

THANKSGIVING FOOD BASKETS



I'm pleased to report that the delivery of Thanksgiving food baskets went very well. We purchased a total of 14 baskets from Food City. Each contained a pre-cooked whole turkey or ham, stuffing, gravy, vegetables, cranberry sauce, buns, etc., along with a card from Erin Church wishing them a Happy Thanksgiving and a blessing. They were delivered cold and could be heated up quite easily. Pastor Stuart and about 5 other adult members of the congregation and 2 children participated in the deliveries. One delivery went to a family that had called in to the Church requesting help. The others went to the refugee family we support (Manjay and her 4 children) and to their neighbors at Norwood Apartments, which is an area with many refugee families.

We arrived at the apartments about 3:15 pm on a sunny, but cool afternoon. Manjay wasn't home yet, so we waited outside. Mary Alice's children rolled around on the grass and played with some of the many other children who came by to see what we were doing. A neighbor helped us call Manjay, who had missed her bus home from English class, but would be there soon. I went to the neighbor's apartment and played for a while with her children and with Mayamu (Manjay's youngest child), who she was babysitting. A refugee family (grandparents, daughter and grandchildren) from Russia started talking to us, with their grandson (about 12) as an interpreter. They told us about their experiences and asked if we knew a doctor who could help with the grandmother's chronic headaches. We were invited up to their apartment for tea, which we declined, because we didn't want to miss Manjay. The grandmother went upstairs and 30 minutes later sent down a plate of fresh-baked round bread. It was delicious and we ate it on the spot. Sonja walked along hand-in-hand with the grandmother, talking in different languages, but communicating nonetheless. A school teacher from nearby Norwood Elementary came by to chat. He had the day off, so had come to Norwood to help out with some of the refugee families. Manjay and the rest of her children soon arrived, smiling and delighted to see us.

We asked Manjay to direct the distribution of food baskets and she thoughtfully considered this. She chose one for her family, then gave directions to the children on making deliveries to the most needy families (which were usually refugee families). One went to the Russian grandmother, another to her daughter, others to families from Liberia and wherever. The children carried the baskets on their heads, like they would have in their home village.

It was a wonderful experience, filled with joy and touched by the Holy Spirit. I'd like to thank our congregation for the giving that makes all of our Outreach activities possible. I'd also like to invite you all to participate in future Outreach activities.

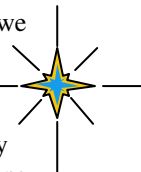
The UTK Presbyterian Center Chili Cook Off

Donations to Erin

For those families that claim federal deductions on Schedule A of Form 1040, a change in rules has been activated by the passage of the Pension Protection Act of 2006. The effective date of this change is August 17, 2006. Some of the changes are as follows:

1. Donors can now exclude from gross income charitable distributions of up to \$100,000 from a Traditional IRA or Roth IR. Prior to 2006 this type of distribution would require the normal payment of Federal income tax on the entire distribution. The following qualifications apply 1) payment is direct from the IRA account to Erin, 2) the payment must take place after the taxpayer has reached the age of 70 1/2, 3) such distributions can not also be used as a charitable deduction, and 4) the distribution is made after 12/31/2005 and before 01/01/2008.
2. No deduction is allowed for loose cash. Cash may be used as a donation if it is placed in an envelope that contains the donor's name. The remainder of the conventional collection plate giving remains the same.
3. Donations-In-Kind, for example, household goods or clothing, can not be deducted unless the donated items are in "good" condition. (To date "good" has not been defined). Donations of this type may be deducted as long as the donor has a receipt from Erin showing the written description of the donation, the value of which is assumed to be less than \$500. The receipt must show the description of the donation, and a statement of the value of any goods or services, if any, provided by Erin in return for the donation. The deduction would be the

difference between these two numbers. Your donation of goods of this type will be acknowledged by Erin by signing your brief written description of the items. The value of the items should not be placed on this list as Erin is not responsible for acknowledging the estimated value. This is done exclusively by the donor.

4. Donations of food, clothing, household items, jewelry, or collections valued over \$500 must be accompanied by a qualified appraisal. Should any of the items discussed above be collected by Erin for resale the amount eligible for federal deduction would be the resale price.
