

OVEMBER Give Thanks

Stewardship, PW & BreadBreakers

As you are no doubt aware, depending on your financial circumstances, your Tithes and Gifts to The Lord through your

Sunday Offerings may reward you in THIS life also - through lower Income Taxes.

Currently, there is a Policy Debate raging in Washington over a Possible Income Tax Reform and /or Tax Rate Cuts. You should monitor these discussions, as they may affect your Income Taxes, possibly even this year! I've named this article:

"Federal Income Tax Reform: Will They or Won't They and How Will it Affect My Charitable Deduction for Erin Contributions?"

Short Answer: "Shrugs"

Honestly, they don't even know. "They" meaning, of course, Washington Politicians. It does seem likely that some type of Income Tax Rate Cut and/or Reform will take place before the 2018 Mid-Term Elections. What form it will take and when it will take effect is anyone's guess, however.

Some possible Scenarios and their potential effect on you:

1.Tax Rate Cut enacted, Retroactive to January 1, 2017. Charitable Contributions still allowed. This scenario may actually decrease the Tax Saving impact of your Charitable Contributions to Erin in 2017. Example: Before the Tax Rate cut you were in the 25% Tax Bracket. For every \$100 contributed to Erin, therefore, you would have reduced your taxes by \$25. If "They" lower your Tax Bracket to 20%, however, then for every \$100 you contribute to Erin your taxes would drop by \$20.

2. Tax Rate Cut, NOT Retroactive, but goes into effect January 1, 2018. Your 2017 Charitable Contributions to Erin would not be impacted by changes. Your 2018 Contributions may, however. Since we are currently using a Fiscal year (July 1 to June 30) instead of a Calendar year, you may want to "speed up" some of your contributions from 2018 to 2017, in order to receive the greater tax benefit (as shown in example 1 above).

The Good News is, at least for now, no one is discussing getting rid of the deductibility of Charitable Contributions. With Washington however, anything is possible. Make sure you stay current with potential Tax Law changes so you can make some last minute 2017 changes, if they would benefit you.


skills in mothers recovering from addiction. Please prayerfully consider giving to this worthwhile offering.

2020 Elder Statement of Faith Kim Jaynes

I officially became a Christian on April 16, 1968 – that's the day I joined Rocky Hill Baptist Church and was baptized. Over the next few years I was active in their youth group and in a great Christian fellowship that met in the Bearden Junior High cafeteria every day before school. I came to Erin in the winter of my senior year of high school, when Joe and I started dating. Since the Baptist church more or less told members what they should believe, I was impressed by the way Erin encouraged me to ask questions and find out the answers for myself through prayer and Bible study. Joe and I were active in the Sunday evening college group led by Tony and Melanie Thomas. We met in their apartment down the street from the church, and their young son was part of everything we did. They were great role models for us. Joe and I were married by Erin pastor Kerry Stoltzfus after we graduated from U.T. in 1978. We moved to Minneapolis for Joe's graduate school, and found a

We moved to Minneapolis for Joe's graduate school, and found a mission-oriented Presbyterian church and a dedicated small group who helped us grow as a newly married couple, and as Christian parents when Andy was born in 1980. We were far from our families in Tennessee and our budget was tight, so we learned to depend on God and on our church family.

We moved to Massachusetts in 1982 and joined Eliot Presbyterian in downtown Lowell, a city that was a magnet for refugees from the war in Vietnam and Cambodia. Many of them had become Christians in refugee camps, and our church not only offered them a spiritual home but helped with housing, clothing, and furniture as well as assisting with enrolling their children in school, dealing with slum landlords, and anything else that came up. I worked full time with an architect in Boston until Alex was born in 1986, but after that I devoted 20 hours a week to the refugee ministry while teaching college part-time.



We applied for grants and started an ESL class for more than 30 women, providing care for their preschool children. Lessons focused on basic tasks like buying stamps at the post office and calling the school to report a sick child. We also helped locate family members who were still in refugee camps and worked with U.S. and U.N. agencies to try to bring them to America. The church was about half Cambodian, with Vietnamese and Lao members and a few African immigrants along with very traditional Anglo New Englanders.

I loved the hands-on ministry and the pout faith with both long-time and brand

experience of learning about faith with both long-time and brand -new Christians.

We returned to Erin in 1995 when we moved back to Knoxville. We found a welcoming though much smaller congregation, but families were joining because of the enthusiastic and energetic new minister from Scotland.

A few years later I began teaching an adult Sunday School class for people who "didn't already know everything," as one member put it. Today I work full time for an Oak Ridge contractor, but spend as much time as I can supporting Erin and its programs. I served on Erin's Session twice before, and it was rewarding to help lead the congregation in new directions. I look forward to the next few years as we work together to figure out how God wants us to further His kingdom here at Erin, in this community, and in the wider world.

Java Scripture with Kim & Joe Jaynes: This class is using a video series Modern Parables to review parables updated to modern times. Each class focuses on one parable.

Hard Sayings with John House: This class continues the study of Not in God's Name: Confronting Religious Violence.

Connections with John Stuart: For November this class will look at the faith of our presidents. Each Sunday will focus on a different president.

right after Thanksgiving to take to the family.


